waterSmartSM Honors 12 Cobb County Students in 9th Annual Allatoona Ally Artist Challenge

MARIETTA, Ga. (Feb. 3, 2014) – The Cobb County-Marietta Water Authority (CCMWA) and Cobb County Water System congratulate the 12 Cobb County elementary school students chosen as this year’s winners of the Ninth Annual Allatoona Ally Artist Challenge.

The Artist Challenge invited local fourth and fifth grade students to draw Ally — the scaly, but lovable ambassador for Lake Allatoona — conserving water in her home and community. More than 725 entries were received with 27 schools participating.

The top drawings will be featured in a coloring book that will be distributed throughout the community and available for free download at www.watersmart.net. In addition, a party will be held to honor the artists on Wednesday, Feb. 12 at 5 p.m. at the South Cobb Regional Library. The winners will be sworn in as Junior Water Deputies, and experts will speak to students and their families about water conservation.
